SOME PATTERNS TO GET YOU STARTED IN THE WORLD OF LINEAR DRUMMING

Linear drumming is where no two drums are played together - in unison. You might say, well then, I'll just play a bar of single strokes on the snare drum. In the strictest sense of the word you would indeed be playing a linear pattern. However, linear drumming is usually considered to be a series of single notes played between the hands and at least one foot.

Linear patterns (in my humble opinion) add a little extra 'spice' to a fill and are a welcome change to just blasting around the kit in single strokes (although there is a time and a place for that - and it's fun too)!

The following exercises show how two linear patterns; RLRF and LRLF can be used to create fills.

COUNT EVERYTHING

If you can't count it then you can't play it. That is true of everything we learn but it always needs repeating!



Nulla nunc lectus porttitor vitae pulvinar magna

SLOW DOWN

Fast and wrong is still wrong! Take new ideas slowly at first and programme them into your muscle memory before speeding up.
